INTRODUCTION

MAIN IDEA TWO

Introduce the topic, and use examples and explanations. Evaluate how the idea answers the question, and make links back to your previous paragraph.

MAIN IDEA ONE Introduce the topic,

and use examples and explanations. You should also evaluate the idea: how important is it to the question, and why?

CONCLUSION

Remember that a conclusion is where you decide which idea answers the questions best. Don't add any new ideas here. Leave the reader with something to think
